





PROFILE OF SPECIAL GUEST HON. BABOUCARR BOUY

r. Baboucarr Bouy is currently the Minister responsible for Public Service, Administrative Reforms, Policy Coordination and Delivery of The Republic of The Gambia.

The Ministry is established to serve as an oversight body over Public Service Policy of the government, which includes both the core civil service and all other institutions providing public services in the country. It also aims to addresses existing gaps relating to poor policy coordination and uncoordinated approach to public policy implementation. To address this mandate, key reforms have started in the sector to

- Improve analogue processes for human resource management and increase reliability and transparency of human resource data, which is necessary to subsequently digitize HR processes and data;
- Improve the effectiveness and expand the functionalities of government systems for engaging with citizens, including systems for receiving and addressing grievance, complaints, and feedback.

vention platform for direct interaction between policy makers and Ghana's teeming youth across the various region. The Foundation is currently implementing the Ghana Grows Programme to inspire young Ghanaians to pursue decent and fulfilling careers in the Agriculture, Agribusiness and ATVET sectors. His appointment as Minister was preceded by a stint in the NGO Community where he served as the Chief Executive Officer (Africa Region) for an International NGO operating in education and health to serve underprivileged and underserved communities in The Gambia and Guinea Bissau.

Prior to this appointment, Mr. Bouy spent over four decades of his career in the Gambian Civil Service within the education sector rising through the ranks from an assistant teacher to a Permanent Secretary. As Permanent Secretary introduced the following key reforms in the education sector

- a girls' education programme which led to gender parity at all levels of the basic and secondary education levels.
- Introduction of a Performance Management System in the Ministry which

allows every officer to sign a Service Level Agreement which holds him/her accountable to certain deliverables

- Institutionalising a Coordinating Committee Meeting which monitors policy implementation in a participatory manner every two months in the regions.
- Introduction of a comprehensive Reading Programme for Early Grades using the five major National Languages as a basis.
- Transforming the Ministry of Basic and

Secondary Education into a learning institution which uses evidence – based decision making.

• In April 2012, award winner of the World Bank's Jit Gill Memorial Award for Outstanding Public Service which was a competition held all over the World in countries where the World Bank operates. Being the 2nd African ever and the 5th in the World, this award embodies the characteristics of a public servant with unique private sector skills focusing on results.



HON. GREGORY O.W. COLEMANINSPECTOR GENERAL, LIBERIA NATIONAL POLICE

PROFILE OF SPECIAL GUEST HON. GREGORY O. W. COLEMAN

Gregory O. W. Coleman is a highly respected security executive, public policy strategist, and community relations expert known for his visionary leadership. With a diverse background in security enforcement, risk management, and international governance, Coleman has played a pivotal role in advancing both public and private sector initiatives in Liberia.

Coleman's ascent into senior management began with his appointment as Commissioner for Operations of the Liberia National Police (LNP). During this period, he was faced with the challenges of the Ebola crisis. Regardless, his innovative policies and procedures significantly mitigated the epidemic's impact on the Liberia National Police. His approach and effective crisis management were pivotal, underscoring his outstanding leadership capabilities. This success paved the way for his subsequent appointment as Inspector General of Police in 2016. In this esteemed role, Coleman distinguished himself as a leader committed to professionalism, integrity, and community engagement, earning the respect and admiration of

both national and international stakeholders.

As Inspector General of Police and Chairman of the West African Police Chiefs Committee (WAPCO), Coleman's tenure was marked by unprecedented stability in police-community relations. His leadership fostered a culture of professionalism within the Liberia National Police, earning the confidence of both Liberian political leadership and international partners. Under his guidance, the LNP expanded its support base and became a cornerstone of public safety and security in Liberia.

In 2018, Coleman transitioned from hard security to soft security, serving as the Director-General of the National Bureau of Concessions. In this role, he provided critical technical assistance to ministries, agencies, and commissions responsible for granting concessions, thus enhancing transparency and accountability in Liberia's investment landscape.

Driven by his commitment to community empowerment and sustainable development, Coleman later founded Sus-

tainable Initiatives International (SII), a nonprofit organization dedicated to addressing community concerns related to natural resource governance, food security, transparency, and access to justice. Through smart and secure initiatives such as advocacy, economic empowerment, gender mainstreaming, and preventative diplomacy, SII collaborates with communities, investors, companies, and government agencies to build collaborations and create safe and sustainable environments conducive to achieving Sustainable Development Goals.

Most recently, Coleman was appointed by President Joseph N. Boakai to serve again as the Inspector General of Police, reaffirming his status as a trusted leader in law enforcement and public safety in Liberia. Coleman attended the Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA), where he earned a postgraduate diploma in Public Administration in 2013. In 2015 to 2016, he further advanced his education by earning a Master's Degree in Public Policy and Management from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government in the United States. Also 2016, he obtained a certificate in Executive Leadership Training from the University of Louisville. Coleman's dedication to continuous learning and professional development emphasizes his commitment to excellence and his ability to lead with vision and integrity.

PROFILE OF SPECIAL GUEST H.E. ROSEMARY MBABAZI

E. Rosemary Mbabazi, was appointed in March 2023 as Rwanda's High Commissioner to Ghana. She is concurrently accredited to the Republics of Cote d'Ivoire, Benin, Togo, Sierra Leone & Liberia.

Prior to this appointment, she served as the Minister for Youth and Culture in the Rwandan Cabinet since 31st August 2017. From February 2012 to February 2017, she served as the Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Youth and ICT before she was transferred to the Ministry of Trade, Industry and East African Community Affairs (MINEACOM) in the same capacity.

In 2011, Rosemary Mbabazi was ap-

pointed a caretaker of Umubano Hotel and the chairperson of Soprotel, a joint venture between the governments of Rwanda and Libya.

From 2009 until 2011 she headed the Investment Promotion Department in the Rwanda Development Board.

H.E Mbabazi holds a Bachelor's Degree in Education obtained from Makerere University. She also holds a Master of Business Administration from Glasgow Caledonian University in Scotland, United Kingdom.

H.E Mbabazi is family woman, married and a mother to four children.

PROFILE OF GIMPA

he Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIM-PA) was established in 1961 as a joint Ghana government/United Nations Special Fund Project as the Institute of Public Administration (IPA) to develop the public administrative systems and to produce civil servants with the administrative and professional competence to plan and administer national, regional, and local services.

Over the past years, GIMPA's activities have been guided by five successive mandates from the first Legislative Instrument of 1961 to the current GIMPA Act 2004 (Act 676). Each one of them has affirmed the vision of the founders to be a leading national and international Management Development Institute. The mandates progressively expanded the Institute's scope of business to reflect the manpower needs relevant to national development.

The GIMPA Act of 2004 (Act 676) estab-

lished GIMPA as a Chartered Public Tertiary Institute with a mandate to award certificates, diplomas and degrees up to PhD. level. GIMPA now offers education, training and services in the fields of leadership, management, public administration, technology, law and other humanities disciplines for the public sector, private sector and NGOs.

GIMPA operates under a Governing Council appointed by the President of the Republic of Ghana in accordance with Article 70 of the 1992 Constitution.

- School of Public Service and Governance
- Business School
- School of Technology and Social Sciences
- School of Graduate Studies and Research
- GIMPA Law School







ABSTRACT

Vigilantism has assumed a prominent feature in Ghanaian politics in recent times. The prevalence of this extralegal body defies the traditional monopoly of the state on law enforcement and the legitimate use of violence in politics. Whilst some studies have suggested that vigilante outcomes are often violent and lethal, others have pointed to the rationality and effectiveness of these groups. This study examined the nature and implications of political vigilantism in Ghana's democracy. The study highlighted two important gaps left by previous studies: the entrepre-

neurial or economic model and the gender perspective of vigilantism. The study was built on three theoretical underpinnings: the rational choice, the securitization, and the principal-agent theories. It adopted a qualitative case study design to analyze the vigilante phenomenon within the Ghanaian context. A sample size of 46 participants was used to collect data from owners and members of vigilante groups, CSOs, state security agencies, and beneficiaries of vigilante activities. The analysis indicated that political vigilante groups in Ghana were conceptualized along dimensions of character, function, and configuration. It was also discovered that vigilante

groups were sustained by both monetary and non-monetary incentives. The study also found that membership of vigilante groups was primed on commitment, patience, and resistance and that there was a gender dimension to vigilante activities that was often ignored. Based on the findings, a de-construction of the concept of vigilantism in order to address it comprehensively, dealing with the correlatives and root causes, including poverty, institutional weaknesses, and partisan security services was recommended. Finally, a collaborative effort from all stakeholders to fight the menace was recommended.

ABSTRACT

Dynamic risk-exposure in the global business has made healthcare supply chains more vulnerable than ever. Healthcare Supply chain disruptions can have fatal

effects on patient safety, health quality, and national security. Several strategies have been used to study supply chain resilience.

However, the healthcare supply chain

has often lagged behind typical industrial supply chains in implementing resilience supply chain capabilities. Again, the linkage between supply chain resilience and healthcare operational performance in the context of a developing economy has received little empirical support in the literature. The purpose of this research sought to address the design of the healthcare supply chain to overcome risks and adapt to the environment by investigating the relationships between four dominant resilience strategies: visibility, supplier selection, collaboration, inventory control, and moderating variable and their effects on healthcare operational performance from the perspective of dynamic capabilities and relational theories. A quantitative method was deployed with survey data from hospitals in Ghana and the sample frame was made up of government/CHAG/private/mission hospitals in Ghana. An online questionnaire was developed using the Kobocollect toolbox and 338 questionnaires were distributed, a total of 267 were returned resulting in a response rate of 78.9 percent. Partial Least Square Structural Equation Modeling (PLS-SEM) was used to study the relationship between independents, dependents, and moderating variables. The study revealed that supplier selection, collaborations, and inventory control strategies positively affect healthcare operational performance. Moreover, supplier development moderates the effects of supplier selection and collaborations on operational performance. The study reinforces Dynamic Capabilities Theory (DCT) and Relational Theory (RT) when building resilience investment in the era of uncertainty. The findings are likely to improve operational performance by mitigating the effects of vulnerabilities. Healthcare organizations require collaboration, inventory, proper supplier selection, and supplier development to sense, detect, recover, and transform health supply chains from global supply chain turbulences.

ABSTRACT

This study assesses the effect of environmental sustainability risk, development of the financial system, and macroeconomic risk on the socio-economic development of economies in Sub-Sahara Africa. Data

for the analysis were compiled from relevant sources for 40 countries from 2000 to 2020. Development was assessed from the perspective of living standards and well-being of the people (socio-economic development), hence the use of the Human Development Index (HDI) by

the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). The empirical analyses were carried out using the Two-Step System Generalized Method of Moments (TSS-GMM). Estimated results indicate that using genuine sustainability risk as a measure of environmental sustainability risk, an inverted U-shape impact is exerted by environmental degradation on socio-economic development (HDI). Again, the results show that governance and institutional structures do not significantly influence the relationship between genuine sustainability risk and HDI. Using the ecological footprint index as a proxy for environmental sustainability risk however, the results indicate a U-shape relationship, implying that socio-economic development is thwarted at the small-scale or subsistence stage of exploration of land and water resources, but at large-scale or mechanized levels, of development (welfare and standard of living) improves. The study also reveals that improved governance and institutional structures help in alleviating the adverse effect that exploitation of land and water resources on subsistence bases (illegal forms in most cases) has on the socio-economic development of the sub-region, all other things being equal. Results from the empirical estimates, again indicate that macroeconomic risk or instability in key macroeconomic indicators poses a threat to the socio-economic development of the sub-region. In respect of the financial environment, the study reveals that financial development (efficiency, access, depth, and stability) has a significant positive effect on socio-economic development in the sub-region. Again, the results reveal that improved governance and institutional structures (reduced level of corruption, improved governance effectiveness, stabilized political atmosphere, and enhanced regulatory measures) positively influence the effect of financial development on the standard of living and welfare of the people (socio-economic development of the people). Financial stability, financial liberalization, trade openness, and financial freedom also exert a positive impact on the living standards and welfare of the people in the sub-region from the empirical estimates. Relevant policy recommendations have been proffered for implementation based on the conclusions from the study. The study recommends reservation of a proportion of proceeds from extraction of natural resources for future generation and investment in education in pursuit of socio-economic development. Again, policies should be targeted at mechanized, formalized, and large-scale coverage of



human activities on land and water resources as against subsistence forms of engagement of land and water resources for improved socio-economic development. Finally, this study recommends that policymakers pursue strategies that ensure the stability of the macroeconomic

environment and the development of the financial system in pursuit of socio-economic development among economies in the sub-region.

ABSTRACT

This study is made up of four empirical objectives that examine the effect of banking sector reforms on interest rate spread and economic growth in Sub-Saharan Africa and its regional economic communi-

ties. Chapter two presents an overview and stylized facts of the banking industry in Sub-Saharan Africa. The overview revealed that the industry lags behind the other regional bodies globally in terms of depth and penetration of banking institutions, technical innovations, competitive-

ness and ownership structure, efficiency of financial institutions, and in regulation and supervision. Nevertheless, in the past decade, the banking industry performed averagely well in the region, especially in terms of mobile banking in East Africa. Sub-Saharan African nations have made great strides in implementing and fortifying structural reforms aimed at improving the financial intermediation process. The first empirical objective investigates the impact of the banking sector reforms on interest rate spread in Sub-Saharan Africa and its regional economic communities using the Two-Step System General Method of Moments (GMM). The researcher obtained data from the Banker Database, World Development Indicators (WDI), and Global Financial Development Database (GFDD), spanning from 2011 to 2021 from forty-two (42) Sub-Saharan African countries. The empirical findings depict the significance of the bank-specific and industry-specific variables. The various control variables employed also proved to be significant in determining interest rate spread in the region. Specifically, bank size, profitability, liquidity, asset quality (loan loss provision), bank concentration, monetary policy rate, gross domestic product, and inflation significantly influence SSA's bank interest rate spread. The policy implication of this finding is that the ongoing banking sector reforms are relevant in narrowing interest spread. The regulators' and policymakers' industry consolidation reforms should be pursued vigorously. Banks should also intensify efforts towards improving operational efficiency to reduce operating costs. Measures must also be taken to reduce non-performing loans including enhancing borrowers screening mechanisms aided by credit management frameworks at bank-level to reduce credit risk. Sustaining macroeconomic stability and stable inflation could also boost demand for credit and improve loan repayment capabilities, reducing credit risk. Another policy implication is the trade-off between the interest rate spread and the GDP growth rate in SSA and its five main sub-regional markets. The magnitude and the direction of causality (either positive or negative) that the two variables of concern impact on each other must be established. Policymakers should base their decision on further estimating the Cholesky impulse response function (IRF) and the forecast-error variance decomposition (FEVD) analysis. Therefore, it is advised that to address interest rate spread, policymakers take multifaceted, region-specific approaches in the sub-region. The policy of one-fit-all should be discouraged.

ABSTRACT

This doctoral thesis examines the impact of the ongoing banking reforms on bank efficiency and bank competition within the structure-conduct-performance hypothesis (SCPH), efficient structure hypothesis (ESH), the quiet-life hypothesis (QLH), and the Feedback Intervention framework for Africa's sub-regional

markets. Using annual panel data of 498 banks from 49 countries in eight of the main regional economic communities in Africa from 2011–2021, this study employs the nonparametric data envelope analysis (DEA) technique to estimate the level of bank efficiency while the Herfindahl-Hirschman Index was employed as a proxy for the market power hypotheses. Further, the two-step system GMM

was employed to estimate a panel model where the efficiency scores or the HHI are regressed on each of the core sets of the financial soundness indicators (FSIs) while controlling for bank size, monetary policy, and macroeconomic variables.

Despite the marginal improvements in bank efficiency, the scores in Africa are still below the benchmark score of 1. The findings also depict a worrying trend in bank competition as it showcased a marginal improvement in the market powers of the industry players resulting from the ongoing reforms. However, the market concentration indices in the various regional markets measured by the Herfindahl Hirschman Index are within the low concentration index of 1500. While improving the capital adequacy ratio, management efficiency, earnings, liquidity, and sensitivity to market risk are found to have a positive relationship with bank efficiency and market power, a negative relationship between asset quality and bank efficiency and market power is reflected by the banks' inability to optimally utilize the investment in enterprise risk management modules associated with the ongoing banking reforms. There were however mixed results on the impact of the financial soundness indicators on bank market power in some of the selected markets in the sampled data. The study also documents evidence of mixed results on the effect of the control variables on bank efficiency and competition in the various regional markets.

Additionally, this study examines the causal relationship and the direction of causality between bank efficiency, competition, and economic growth in Africa's sub-regional markets using the most recent Panel Vector Autoregressive (PVAR) model developed by (Abrigo & Love, 2016). The results show that bank cost-efficiency positively Granger-causes bank market power and economic growth in Africa which supports the efficient structure hypothesis (ESH) and the feedback intervention theory. The reverse causality running from bank market power to bank cost-efficiency and economic growth, on the other hand, is positive, and therefore, supports the quiet-life hypothesis (QLH) and the structure-conduct-performance hypothesis. The new evidence on the trade-off between bank efficiency and competition in this study offers important policy recommendations and guidance on the ongoing financial soundness reforms in Africa and its eight sub-regional economic communities.
